- + Have designed, specified, or sold products for at least 1 kitchen project in the past year
- + All ages qualify, no quotas
- + Male / female split, no quotas



Kitchen Trends: Functional



Prioritize functionality with a personalized touch



- + Usability continues to be the primary goal for nearly all kitchen categories, but ways of executing on function vary:
 - + Layout/space: logical design that aligns with workflow, includes designated work zones, ease of movement
 - + Flooring: durability
 - + Cooking appliances: multi-functional, efficiency, and ease of use
 - + **Refrigerators**: configurable storage, adjustable temperature zones, more space
 - + Countertops, Floorings, Sinks: minimal upkeep / cleaning
 - + Cabinets and Pantry: ample, but concealed storage
 - + **Lighting**: light to support function or mood (dimmers, task lighting)
- + Personalize functionality and customize features by understanding how the family intends to use the space and the appliances

Functional organization and placement of amenities is important in relation to how you move around as you cook and live in the space.




Using space to its best potential, easy to navigate - taking future mobility into consideration, practical / functional and beautiful (timeless).

Be smart about smart technology



- + Adoption of smart technology seems to be relatively slow, but stronger for lighting and appliances
- + Interest in technology varies by product type:
 - + Wi-Fi connectivity/remote monitoring: popular for lighting and cooking appliances but low demand for dishwashers
 - + Hands free and touch/tap controls: popular for faucets
 - + **Voice activation:** popular for lighting, lower for faucets, refrigerators, and cooking appliances
 - + All tech features: not a mainstream demand for refrigerators
- + Leverage technology to make life easier and to do something that "couldn't be done before"
- + Technology can make a statement about luxury, particularly in unexpected ways


My dream kitchen will include technology that will facilitate the everyday tasks my family performs to improve our overall lifestyle.



Tech in **unexpected areas** (built into the countertop) is another **luxury**.



Hide and conceal the functional pieces



- + Desire for concealed appliances, hidden doors and hidden pantries
- + **Hide dishwashers and refrigerators** with panel-ready fronts that blend with cabinets; panel-ready more popular than stainless steel
- + **Back kitchens** emerging as separate from an entertaining area (consistent with designated work zones)
- + Open pantry and open shelves in cabinets less popular
- + Desire for concealed grout lines in flooring


My dream kitchen would have a show kitchen and a prep kitchen hiding behind a hidden access point.



Cabinetry with flat doors **concealing appliances**, obvious storage spaces with highly integrated appliances and personal "gadgets." Accessories and hardware for pop out—doors revealing unique storage solutions or **secondary prep and areas**.



Flex and adapt with multifunctional spaces and tools



- + Kitchen designs are supporting multiple purposes with designated work zones or stations for all phases of the day
- + Primary areas are food prep and dining/eating; beverage centers are the top trending feature for kitchens
- + Cooking **appliances** also need to support **more than one cooking function** (e.g., oven with air frying, oven with steam oven)
- + Sinks to have built-in cutting boards, drying racks and strainers
- + Look for workstation sinks to double as **both food prep** and **serving areas**
- + Double vision (2 sinks, 2 islands, 2 ovens, 2 dishwashers) emerging, but **not as popular as demand for multifunctional** components


Comfortable and inviting with a clear set of zones for guests, prep, beverages, storage.



The kitchen would be well designed with separate prep spaces, beverage/coffee/bar area and cooking areas. An extra wide workstation prep sink with two faucets (one on either end) will provide maximum functionality for two cooks.



Elevate function and style with lighting



- + Lighting remains a top consideration in kitchen design, serving many functions:
 - + Improves **usability** of kitchen spaces
 - + Creates mood
 - + Establishes design focal points
 - + Make statements about **personality**
 - + Supports health and wellness
- + Dimmable features, mobile connectivity and motion sensor lighting
- + Built-in lighting (under-cabinet and interior-cabinet), pendants, and recessed lights will be popular fixtures
- + Shapes expected to be mostly round or linear, but no clear style expected to dominate
- + Permission to mix and match light fixtures


Good overhead lighting above cabinets to illuminate countertop working space and undercabinet lighting.

Extend sustainability beyond materials to timeless designs and product longevity



- + Sustainability in kitchens continues to influence design decisions:
 - + Sustainable materials (reclaimed or recycled countertops, sustainable backsplashes, environmentally-friendly cabinets/flooring and islands) are **not broadly requested at this time**
 - + Some need space in kitchen for **recycling and composting bins**
 - + **Product longevity** supports sustainable efforts
 - + Desire for **timeless style** can be seen in colors and design; no need to redo kitchen
 - + Homeowners want kitchens that can **function as the homeowner ages**; be sustainable over time for their needs
 and preferences

Seek a kitchen that functions well as I age, place to gather.



I would opt for tones that are neutral and timeless like white oak.



Kitchen Trends: Emotional & Physical Well-Being



Connect with nature



- + Being connected with nature and organic/natural styles continue to popular in the kitchen
- + Subtle usage of term "biophilic" (connectivity to the natural environment) to describe dream kitchens
- + Desire for large windows to let in natural, outdoor light
- + Herb and veggie gardens in kitchens are increasingly popular
- + Window walls are sought for clear outside views
- + Earth tones from the 70s more likely to make a comeback than colors from any other decade
- + Earthy colors are among the preferred colors for floors and backsplashes
- + Mentions of outdoor kitchens as way to take inside out

Large, open to the rest of the home and outside, place for socialization, informal conversations, natural materials, minimal design.




So, having the kitchen and living room open up to the outside space is very important to blur the lines of inside and out.

Make a statement, but do so thoughtfully



- + Personal statements continue to be included in kitchen design
 - + Use lighting, faucet, islands, backsplashes, and hoods to make a statement
 - + Blend/be invisible with refrigerators, flooring, sinks, and dishwashers
 - Panel-ready appliances for dishwashers and refrigerators support desire to blend these functional components
 - Prefer decorative hardware on cabinets over minimalistic designs
 - + Use lighting to set moods
 - + Pops of color and artwork can convey personality



Healthy living starts in the kitchen



- + Kitchens continue to be a place to support healthy living and wellness
 - + Integrate healthy eating and sustainable food sources into kitchen design
 - + Consider water and air quality in kitchen design
 - + Install **refrigerators with more space** to accommodate healthy eating
 - + Steam cooking and air fryers are more popular
 - + Let in **natural light** with larger windows and glass doors
 - Incorporate areas for recycling and composting bins/containers



Kitchens with an overall focus on **food preservation and health/wellness** would be ideal for me. I like the idea of a kitchen
that feels like a spa, or something you might experience in a highend vacation rental. A statement that **feels good and nurturing**.



Kitchen Trends: Aesthetics



Open out, up, and within



- + Open is a key component of dream kitchens
- + Open out the kitchen to both interior rooms and exterior space; taking down walls continues to be popular to open to new areas of the home
- + Open up by creating "ceiling interest" with vaulted ceilings and skylights
- + Open within using uncluttered counters and large spaces around the perimeter of the kitchen
- + Larger windows and glass doors to create an open and airy feel


Open and airy. Larger spaces in between perimeter and island walkways. Uncluttered countertops.

Mix and match to evaluate design



- + Mixing and matching backsplash materials / shapes / color for unique look growing in popularity
- + Acceptable to mix and match lighting materials like metal, glass, and fabric
- + Don't always need to match lighting to faucet, or faucet to cabinet hardware
- + Largely prefer different color on island and main kitchen cabinets versus a consistent color scheme across the two

Warm natural elements paired with deeper tones (i.e., stained oak cabinets with light tile and dark countertops). Add a colourful runner.



Color the kitchen with light, warm and natural tones



- + Preference for kitchens with color versus white kitchens
 - + Color beats whites, with greens and blues more popular than gray (consistent with desire to connect with nature)
- + Light continues to be favored over dark in nearly all cases when it comes to the kitchen:
 - + Prefer **rich and warm** cabinet colors; seek light colors, not dark
 - + Top backsplash colors are **warm neutrals and earth tones**; bright colors and pastels least popular
 - + Prefer that countertops be **lighter than cabinets** (not darker)
 - + Desire for **lighter wood tones and warm neutrals** in flooring; dark floors not gaining popularity





Dream Kitchen: Key Themes



Comments: Designers' "Dream Kitchen"

Bold color cabinets in a large welcoming space, centered as the hub of the home and entertaining. Large island with lots of workspace and seating. Butler's pantry with large amounts of storage adjacent to the kitchen.

Inside the kitchen a workspace for two to three cooks, with easy access to a large pantry and a backyard of assorted toys (BGE smoker, pizza oven, Blackstone grill). A large island and the kitchen opens to the dining and family rooms, with good access to a large deck, all areas where family and friends could gather.

A large, open area to the rest of the home and outside, a place for socialization, informal conversations with natural materials and minimal design.

A dream design I often try to incorporate is the idea of eclectic elements that span multiple design periods. A mix of stone, wood, paint and classical metals is the absolute minimum of material components in my dream design.

Some unique lighting on the ceiling and walls, cabinets and a pop of neon for personality. Tile backsplashes, quartzite countertop, real wood floors with inlays or borders like a castle would be stellar.

I want naturally stained cabinets, exposed beams, folksy hand painted ceramic tile, terra cotta/concrete like floors, wrought iron hardware and fixtures with some warm saturated colors and a house plant / herb vibe. Authenticity is a must!

High-tech appliances, smart solutions for composting, multiple focal points, and enhanced with architectural lighting. No more gas ranges, there are too many good induction options. Kitchens with an overall focus on food preservation and health/wellness would be ideal for me.


From statement lighting fixtures casting a warm glow over artisanal countertops to striking geometric patterns adorning the backsplash, every element harmonizes to craft an immersive culinary experience. With bold accents and unexpected textures.

It would have a walk-in butler's pantry with a sink, tall pantry cabinet with slide-outs and hidden micro - pop-up appliance shelf. A vintage look, but modern appliances with slab doors and painted a light creamy greige. And a large island in a warm light-stained rustic maple.






















































